



The Liturgy: Our Gift and Our Peace

We have entered a time of extreme uncertainty in the world. This uncertain time for the world can give us a renewed dependence on God and a renewed vigor for the Mass. This uncertain time is not a new experience for the world. The very first Catholic Masses were celebrated in a time and place where humans were slaughtered for entertainment, criminals were publicly executed, new born babies were left unwanted in the streets, Christians were martyred, and **evangelization was a wildfire that could not be extinguished**. Our Catholic faith took root with an eschatological, or apocalyptic, perspective on the world. There was a clear divide between the pagan Roman world and the newly emerging Christian world. Though our time today is different in many ways, it is the same in many ways as we clearly see the culture around us becoming more pagan and barbaric.

It is easy to feel the swelling eschatological tension, the apocalyptic current that is rising in today's day to day life. And by God's design the Liturgy is a treasured gift to strengthen us so that we **face the challenges before us free from fear!** Vatican II has given us a very important tool for receiving grace from the Mass to become fearless believers. It is the reminder to engage the liturgy with a **fully conscious and active participation**. What does fully conscious and active participation look like?

An easy start is to **avoid mindlessly reciting the prayers at Mass**. Revelation 3:16 states, "So, because you are lukewarm, neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth." And from Isaiah 29:13, "...this people draw near with words only and honors me with their lips alone, though their hearts are far from me..."

We strive to pray from the depths of our human frailty, from the depths of our dependence on God. The response to the prayers of the faithful is not just to say mindlessly, "Lord, hear our prayer." **Our aim is to truly pray, to sincerely ask God the Father to hear our prayer.** We do not approach the music at Mass as karaoke or entertainment, but we allow the Holy Spirit to use the songs to reopen our souls to repentance, to surrender, and to God's grace.

The Roman Catholic liturgy allows us to be properly oriented in God's creation when we fully engage our hearts and minds with the words used at Mass. God used words to speak the universe into motion. When we look at the heavens and the earth, we see creation, the echo chamber for God's voice. It is as if God yelled into a canyon and His voice is still echoing. God says, "Let there be light," and we have the big bang which echoed into stars which echoed into galaxies and so forth to you and your children! **When we speak and sing at Mass, we are literally echoing the creative glory of God in us back to Him, especially with the words, "For the Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory are Yours, now and forever."**

Vatican II encourages us to not just allow the Mass to happen outside of us at the pulpit and on the altar. Vatican II encourages us to allow the Mass to move us at the depth of our humanity, to move our human soul to be united with God from the inside. When the homily is being delivered, we allow the homily to be preached not just from the pulpit but from inside of us. We allow Jesus' message through the gift of his priesthood to reach our hearts, not just our ears. We allow our souls, our essence, to be prepared for receiving Jesus Christ as the Eucharist when the presider prays the prayers of consecration. We allow the prayers to soften our hearts to an ever-deepening conversion. When we receive Jesus, we become living tabernacles. "Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the words and my soul shall be healed."

If we Catholics, whether praying in the pew, lecturing, serving on the altar, ushering, etc., truly enter into the Mass we become transformed. For example, the world's greatest athletes do not simply make great plays, they become the very game itself. The more and more we enter into the Mass, the chaos of the world is rendered less effective on us. As we intentionally participate in Mass more and more the chaos of the world is not just ineffective, God begins to use us for His purposes of bringing it into order. **"Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory are Yours, now and forever."**

La Liturgia: Nuestro regalo y Nuestra Paz

Hemos entrado en una época de extrema incertidumbre en el mundo. Este tiempo incierto para el mundo puede darnos una renovada dependencia de Dios y un renovado vigor para la Misa. Este tiempo incierto no es una experiencia nueva para el mundo. Las primeras misas católicas se celebraron en una época y un lugar donde se sacrificaba a los seres humanos para divertirse, se ejecutaba públicamente a los delincuentes, se dejaba a los bebés no deseados en las calles, se martirizaba a los cristianos y **la evangelización era un incendio forestal que no podía extinguirse**. Nuestra fe católica echó raíces con una perspectiva escatológica o apocalíptica del mundo. Había una clara división entre el mundo pagano romano y el nuevo mundo cristiano emergente. Aunque nuestro tiempo hoy es diferente en muchos aspectos, es el mismo en muchos aspectos, ya que vemos claramente que la cultura que nos rodea se vuelve más pagana y bárbara.

Es fácil sentir la creciente tensión escatológica, la corriente apocalíptica que se eleva en el día a día de hoy. ¡Y por diseño de Dios, la Liturgia es un regalo preciado para fortalecernos para que **enfrentemos los desafíos que tenemos ante nosotros sin temor!** El Vaticano II nos ha dado una herramienta muy importante para recibir la gracia de la Misa y convertirnos en creyentes intrépidos. Es el recordatorio de participar en la liturgia con una participación activa y plenamente consciente. ¿Cómo se ve la participación plena consciente y activa?

Un comienzo fácil es **evitar recitar las oraciones sin pensar en la misa**. Apocalipsis 3:16 dice: "Entonces, porque eres tibio, ni caliente ni frío, te escupiré de mi boca". Y de Isaías 29:13, "... este pueblo se acerca solo con palabras y me honra solo con sus labios, aunque su corazón está lejos de mí ..."

Vivimos para orar desde lo más profundo de nuestra fragilidad humana, desde lo más profundo de nuestra dependencia de Dios. La respuesta a las oraciones de los fieles no es simplemente decir sin pensar: "Te rogamos Señor, oyenos". **Nuestro objetivo es orar verdaderamente, pedir sinceramente a Dios Padre que escuche nuestra oración**. No nos acercamos a la música en la Misa como karaoke o entretenimiento, pero permitimos que el Espíritu Santo use las canciones para reabrir nuestras almas al arrepentimiento, a la entrega y a la gracia de Dios.

La liturgia católica romana nos permite orientarnos adecuadamente en la creación de Dios cuando involucramos completamente nuestros corazones y mentes con las palabras que se usan en la Misa. Dios usó palabras para hacer que el universo se pusiera en movimiento. Cuando miramos los cielos y la tierra, vemos la creación, la cámara de resonancia de la voz de Dios. Es como si Dios gritara en un cañón y Su voz aún resuena. Dios dice: "Hágase la luz", ¡y tenemos el Big Bang que resonó en las estrellas, que resonó en las galaxias, etc., para usted y sus hijos! **Cuando hablamos y cantamos en misa, literalmente estamos haciendo eco de la gloria creativa de Dios en nosotros de regreso a Él**, especialmente con las palabras, **"Porque el Reino, el Poder y la Gloria son Tuyos, ahora y por siempre"**.

El Vaticano II nos anima a no solo permitir que la Misa ocurra fuera de nosotros en el púlpito y en el altar. El Vaticano II nos anima a permitir que la Misa nos conmueva lo más profundo de nuestra humanidad, que mueva nuestra alma humana a estar unida a Dios desde adentro. Cuando se está pronunciando la homilía, permitimos que la homilía se predique no solo desde el púlpito sino desde dentro de nosotros. Permitimos que el mensaje de Jesús a través del don de su sacerdocio llegue a nuestro corazón, no solo a nuestros oídos. Permitimos que nuestras almas, nuestra esencia, estén preparadas para recibir a Jesucristo como Eucaristía cuando el celebrante reza las oraciones de consagración. Permitimos que las oraciones ablanden nuestros corazones hacia una conversión cada vez más profunda. Cuando recibimos a Jesús nos convertimos en tabernáculos vivientes. **"Señor, no soy digno de recibirte, pero solo di las palabras y mi alma será sanada"**.

Si los católicos, ya sea rezando en la banca, leyendo, sirviendo en el altar, acomodando, etc., realmente entramos en la misa, nos transformamos. Por ejemplo, los mejores atletas del mundo no solo hacen grandes jugadas, se convierten en el mismo juego. Cuanto más entramos en la Misa, el caos del mundo se vuelve menos efectivo para nosotros. A medida que participamos intencionalmente en la Misa cada vez más, el caos del mundo no solo es ineficaz, Dios comienza a usarlos para Sus propósitos de ponerlo en orden. **"Padre nuestro, que estás en los cielos, santificado sea tu nombre. Venga tu reino, hágase tu voluntad en la tierra como en el cielo. Danos hoy nuestro pan de cada día y perdona nuestras ofensas, como nosotros perdonamos a los que nos ofenden; y no nos dejes caer en la tentación, mas líbranos del mal. Porque tuyos son el Poder, el Reino y la Gloria, ahora y por siempre Señor"**.

Thursday, Aug 20, 2020**MEMORIAL OF BERNARD, ABBOT, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH****Faithful through thick and thin**

Today is the Memorial of Bernard of Clairvaux, whose impact on Europe in the 12th century was profound and whose influence lives on worldwide in Cistercian monasteries and Catholic theology. He was a scholar (whose books are still readily available), a skilled arbitrator, mystic, monk, reformer, and leader of Europe's second crusade (a violent venture that ended badly). Through his successes and mistakes, Bernard of Clairvaux aimed to follow Jesus. We are called to do the same. Do one thing today that puts your heart, mind, or skills to the service of God.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezekiel 36:23-28; Matthew 22:1-14 (422)*. "Tell those invited: 'Behold, I have prepared my banquet, my calves and fattened cattle are killed, and everything is ready; come to the feast.'"

Friday, Aug 21, 2020**MEMORIAL OF PIUS X, POPE****The right of kings that was wrong**

Shortly after the turn of the 20th century, Giuseppe Sarto was elected Pope Pius X, but not without controversy. The leading vote-getter of the papal conclave was Mariano Rampolla, but Polish Cardinal Jan Kosielsko exercised a veto in the name of Emperor Franz Joseph. That swung the vote to Sarto. It was the last time a reigning monarch exercised a longstanding right of veto in a papal conclave. Government interference in church leadership has always been an issue, though today less so in most (though not all) parts of the world. Pray for a worldwide church that answers to only one Lord, Jesus.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezekiel 37:1-14; Matthew 22:34-40 (423)*. "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind."

Saturday, Aug 22, 2020**MEMORIAL OF THE QUEENSHIP OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY****She wears her crown well**

Though queenship is a concept quite foreign to a democratic society (especially one that threw off royal rulership at its founding!), when applied to Mary it can be understood as an expression of the Holy Mother's central role in the reign of God. Though today's feast, established in 1954, is quite recent in terms of the larger sweep of church history, associations of Mary with queenship go back to the angel Gabriel's announcement that Mary's son would inherit the throne of King David. Allow Mary to reign in your heart, especially at times when you are called on to take a leap of faith, as Mary certainly was when Gabriel revealed her mission to her.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezekiel 43:1-7b; Matthew 23:1-12 (424)*. "Son of man, this is where my throne shall be."

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
