



Gospel - Luke 6:27-38

Jesus said to his disciples: "To you who hear I say, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. To the person who strikes you on one cheek, offer the other one as well, and from the person who takes your cloak, do not withhold even your tunic. Give to everyone who asks of you, and from the one who takes what is yours do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you. For if you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners do the same. If you lend money to those from whom you expect repayment, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, and get back the same amount. But rather, love your enemies and do good to them, and lend expecting nothing back; then your reward will be great and you will be children of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. "Stop judging and you will not be judged. Stop condemning and you will not be condemned. Forgive and you will be forgiven. Give, and gifts will be given to you; a good measure, packed together, shaken down, and overflowing, will be poured into your lap. For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you."

REFLECTION ON THE WORD OF GOD. SEVENTH SUNDAY.

This weekend we celebrate the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time of the liturgical year. Mother church continues with her catechesis on discipleship. Two weeks ago (on the fifth Sunday), we focused our meditation on our responses to various vocations. We acknowledged that "God does not call qualified but qualifies the called." Last Sunday, (the Sixth Sunday), Jesus presented to us the new way of attaining blessed life – the Beatitudes. The negative aspects of our life like poverty, hunger and weeping can be turned into blessedness when they are embraced, with the help of God, in humility and simplicity. On this Sunday, you and I, as disciples of Jesus, are presented with another principle to guide our life. It is a Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31).

The narrative about the feud between David and Saul, which is found in the first reading, sends chills down our spines and gives us goosebumps. Saul had been hunting for David, intending to kill him. As a result, David and his companions were on constant run. On one occasion, as it is presented in today's reading, David was on close proximity with Saul and his aids were deep asleep. One would expect David to use that opportunity to strike Saul dead. On the contrary, David did not do that. He told Abishai his servant not to kill Saul. "Do not harm him, for who can lay a hand on the Lord's anointed and remain innocent" (1 Samuel 26:9). David spared the life of Saul, because he recognized in him the seal of anointment. Twice in today's reading, David speaks about the importance of the Lord's anointed one. "Do not lay your hand on the Lords anointed... Do not harm the Lord's anointed" (1 Samuel 26:9,11). My dear friends, during Baptism we were anointed as Kings, Prophets, and Priests. Through the Sacrament of Baptism, we share in the mission of Jesus who is "The Anointed of the Lord" The Christ.

David teaches us about the sacredness of life, which originates and have ultimate end in God. Every human being is the anointed of the Lord and has the right to life. The Lord says: "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you, and before you were born, I consecrated you" (Jeremiah 1:5). We were created by God out of his own love and will and we are supposed to leave this world when God wills. To be a Christian, therefore, is to be PRO-LIFE. We are called upon to protect life by all means from the womb to the tomb. Surely, my friends, the Lord is kind and merciful (Psalm 103), as we have prayed in today's Responsorial Psalm. It is this same kindness and mercy, which all of us Christians are invited to manifest in the practice of our faith and how we can conduct our daily business.

Jesus introduces a new way on how we should relate to each other. He does not change the Law of Moses, which is summarized in the 10 commandments. He does not remove the law of the love of God and neighbor, because it is the greatest commandment. In addition to this Jesus wants his disciples to take a step further. He gives a unique Christian identity. He wants us to practice the **Golden Rule**. "Do unto others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). In otherwards, the yardstick for our moral and ethical excellence starts with how we treat other people and not how we expect them to treat us. This is what distinguishes a Christian from other people. Are you ready for the challenge?

Most people in the world today want to live in a bubble. They want to live with all the possible comfort and security, without taking the trouble of facing the challenges that arise in human relations. Today Jesus is asking us to come out of the bubble and turn the other cheek to those who strike us. He wants us to forgive our enemies. He wants us to extend a loving and kind hand to those who hate us. He wants us to pray for those who mistreat us. This way of living is easier said than done. However, with God's help it is possible. We have living examples to prove that it is possible. We have living examples to prove that it is possible. We have living examples to prove that it is possible with God. Allow me to mention a few:

- John Paul II on May 13, 1981, Mehmet Agca attempted to assassinate Pope John Paul II. Luckily enough he survived, and Mehmet was arrested and imprisoned. On December 27, 1982, Pope John Paul II visited him in prison. The two met in private and talked. The Pope forgave his would-be assassin, leaving a powerful teaching to all of us: to forgive those who harm us.
- **Immaculate Ilibagiza** is a Rwandese woman who survived the 1994 Rwanda genocide. She spent some years as refugee in the USA. When the genocide was over, she went back to Rwanda and shook hands with the man who killed her parents.

You and I also can practice **The Golden Rule**, starting not with big things and send shock waves to the world, but with little acts of kindness, mercy, and forgiveness. As Mother Teresa of Calcutta says: "We are called to do little things with greater love."

May our Lord Jesus Christ give us the grace to be his true disciples. May we do unto others as we would wish them do to us. Amen.

Evangelio - Lucas 6, 27-38

Ustedes, en cambio, amen a sus enemigos, hagan el bien y presten sin esperar recompensa. Así tendrán un gran premio y serán hijos del Altísimo, porque él es bueno hasta con los malos y los ingratos. Sean misericordiosos, como su Padre es misericordioso.

No juzguen y no serán juzgados; no condenen y no serán condenados; perdonen y serán perdonados. Den y se les dará: recibirán una medida buena, bien sacudida, apretada y rebosante en los pliegues de su túnica. Porque con la misma medida con que midan, serán medidos".

REFLEXIÓN SOBRE LA PALABRA DE DIOS. SÉPTIMO DOMINGO.

Este fin de semana celebramos el Séptimo Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario del año litúrgico. La iglesia madre continúa con su catequesis sobre el discipulado. Hace dos semanas (el quinto domingo), centramos nuestra meditación en nuestras respuestas a varias vocaciones. Reconocimos que "Dios no llama a los capacitados sino que capacita a los llamados". El domingo pasado (el sexto domingo), Jesús nos presentó la nueva forma de alcanzar una vida bienaventurada: las Bienaventuranzas. Los aspectos negativos de nuestra vida como la pobreza, el hambre y el llanto pueden convertirse en bienaventuranza cuando se abrazan, con la ayuda de Dios, con humildad y sencillez. En este domingo, a ti y a mí, como discípulos de Jesús, se nos presenta otro principio para guiar nuestra vida. Es una regla de oro: "Haz a los demás como quieres que te hagan a ti" (Lucas 6:31).

La narración sobre la enemistad entre David y Saúl, que se encuentra en la primera lectura, nos provoca escalofríos y nos pone la piel de gallina. Saúl había estado buscando a David con la intención de matarlo. Como resultado, David y sus compañeros tenían que huir constantemente. En una ocasión, como se presenta en la lectura de hoy, David estaba muy cerca de Saúl y sus ayudantes estaban profundamente dormidos. Uno esperaría que David aprovechara esa oportunidad para matar a Saúl. Al contrario, David no hizo eso. Le dijo a Abisai su siervo que no matara a Saúl. "No le hagáis daño, porque ¿quién podrá tocar al ungido del Señor y quedar inocente?" (1 Samuel 26:9). David perdonó la vida a Saúl, porque reconoció en él el sello de la unción. Dos veces en la lectura de hoy, David habla de la importancia del ungido del Señor. "No extiendas tu mano sobre el ungido del Señor... No hagas daño al ungido del Señor" (1 Samuel 26:9,11). Queridos amigos, durante el Bautismo fuimos ungidos como Reyes, Profetas y Sacerdotes. A través del Sacramento del Bautismo, compartimos la misión de Jesús quien es "El Ungido del Señor" El Cristo.

David nos enseña sobre el carácter sagrado de la vida, que se origina y tiene fin último en Dios. Todo ser humano es el ungido del Señor y tiene derecho a la vida. El Señor dice: "Antes que te formase en el vientre, te conocí, y antes que nacieras, te santifiqué" (Jeremías 1:5). Fuimos creados por Dios por su propio amor y voluntad y se supone que debemos dejar este mundo cuando Dios quiera. Ser cristiano, por tanto, es ser PROVIDA. Estamos llamados a proteger la vida por todos los medios desde el útero hasta la tumba. Seguramente, amigos míos, el Señor es bondadoso y misericordioso (Salmo 103), como hemos orado en el Salmo responsorial de hoy. Es esta misma bondad y misericordia que todos los cristianos estamos invitados a manifestar en la práctica de nuestra fe y en la forma en que podemos llevar a cabo nuestros asuntos diarios.

Jesús introduce una nueva forma de relacionarnos unos con otros. No cambia la Ley de Moisés, que se resume en los 10 mandamientos. No elimina la ley del amor a Dios y al prójimo, porque es el mandamiento más grande. Además, Jesús quiere que sus discípulos den un paso más. Da una identidad cristiana única. Quiere que practiquemos la Regla de Oro. "Haz a los demás como te gustaría que te hicieran a ti" (Lucas 6:31). En otras palabras, el criterio de nuestra excelencia moral y ética comienza con cómo tratamos a otras personas y no cómo esperamos que nos traten a nosotros. Esto es lo que distingue a un cristiano de otras personas. ¿Estás listo para el desafío?

La mayoría de la gente en el mundo hoy quiere vivir en una burbuja. Quieren vivir con todas las comodidades y seguridad posibles, sin tomarse la molestia de afrontar los desafíos que surgen en las relaciones humanas. Hoy Jesús nos pide que salgamos de la burbuja y pongamos la otra mejilla a quienes nos golpean. Quiere que perdonemos a nuestros enemigos. Él quiere que extendamos una mano amorosa y bondadosa a quienes nos odian. Quiere que oremos por quienes nos maltratan. Esta forma de vida es más fácil de decir que de hacer. Sin embargo, con la ayuda de Dios es posible. Tenemos ejemplos vivos que demuestran que es posible. Tenemos ejemplos vivos que demuestran que con Dios es posible. Permítanme mencionar algunos:

- Juan Pablo II el 13 de mayo de 1981, Mehmet Agca intentó asesinar al Papa Juan Pablo II. Afortunadamente sobrevivió y Mehmet fue arrestado y
 encarcelado. El 27 de diciembre de 1982 el Papa Juan Pablo II lo visitó en prisión. Los dos se reunieron en privado y hablaron. El Papa perdonó a su
 posible asesino y nos dejó a todos una poderosa enseñanza: perdonar a quienes nos hacen daño.
- Inmaculada Ilibagiza es una mujer ruandesa que sobrevivió al genocidio de Ruanda de 1994. Pasó algunos años como refugiada en Estados Unidos. Cuando terminó el genocidio, regresó a Ruanda y estrechó la mano del hombre que mató a sus padres.

Tú y yo también podemos practicar La Regla de Oro, comenzando no con grandes cosas y enviando ondas de choque al mundo, sino con pequeños actos de bondad, misericordia y perdón. Como dice la Madre Teresa de Calcuta: "Estamos llamados a hacer las pequeñas cosas con mayor amor".

Que nuestro Señor Jesucristo nos dé la gracia de ser sus verdaderos discípulos. Que hagamos a los demás como nos gustaría que nos hicieran a nosotros. Amén.






